Currently in its 6th year, The Architecture Drawing Prize continues to celebrate the art of drawing in three categories: hand-drawn, hybrid and digital.

This year the Prize has attracted 138 entries with a strong majority of hand-drawn entries. As in previous years, the submissions are from around the world, attesting to the truly international nature of the Prize and the great skill and originality of entrants.

The 2022 Winner of the Hand-Drawn Category is 'The Spirit of Mountain' by Weicheng Ye. Drawn with pencil, the exceptionally atmospheric work explores the relationship between the man-made and nature. The Architecture Drawing Prize Jury Chair and Director of the World Architecture Festival (WAF), Paul Finch, describes the work:

"This is a drawing of great delicacy which highlights the difference between a tall-building aesthetic, and the possibility of disrupting it in a creative way via the insertion of nature as artistic intervention. A very worthy winner."

The 2022 Hybrid Category winner is 'Fitzroy Food Institute' by Samuel Wen. The drawing explores themes around Chinese culture, globalization and automation. Ken Shuttleworth, founder of Make Architects and one of the eight Prize judges, comments:



Anton Markus Pasing who was the Overall Winner of The Architecture Drawing Prize in 2019 was selected as Digital Category winner this year. His drawing 'The Wall' plays on ideas around the beginning, the end and the finite.

Artists Ben Langlands and Nikki Bell who have been on The Architecture Drawing Prize as judges since its inception in 2017 explain why Pasing's approach to drawing impressed the jury again:

"The Wall fills the view with a golden elevation: expansive and richly complex, it appears both vertical and horizontal, before us and below us, a terrain of construction and sedimented accumulation. It is not a border or a barrier, it is a space itself, a place of habitation, a record of social interaction. The wall is like time, it is history in the making."



Fitzroy Food Institute by Samuel Wen and Michael Ren has been named the overall winner of the 2022 Architecture Drawing Prize. Awarded by the World Architecture Festival, Make Architects, and Sir John Soane's Museum, the winning drawing was selected from the three winners of the prize's main categories: hand-drawn, hybrid, and digital.

The winner of the hybrid category, *Fitzroy Food Institute* depicts a dumpling institute that deviates from traditional views of Chinese culture, while also examining ideas of globalization and automation. To create the drawing, the authors blended a range of media including a plan, two sections, two elevations, four views, six diagrams, one detail, and two call-outs. The drawings are imaginatively arranged in a top-down view of a typical Chinese roundtable dining experience.


The drawing was chosen as the overall winner of the 2022 edition by a jury consisting of artists Nikki Bell and Ben Langlands, Sir John Soane's Museum director Bruce Boucher, artist Pablo Bronstein, WAF director Paul Finch, Jencks Squared co-founder Lily Jencks, Iris Ceramica Group CEO Federica Minozzi, Foster + Partners senior partner Narinder Sagoo, and Make Architects founder Ken Shuttleworth. Reflecting on the decision, Shuttleworth praised the drawing as one that "stands out for its well-considered and subtle use of color," as well as being "conceptually original and genuinely delightful."

A hand-drawn and digital artwork submitted jointly by a pair of MArch students has been named overall winner of the 2022 Architecture Drawing Prize

The drawing, Fitzroy Food Institute, by Melbourne-based Samuel Wen and UC Berkeley post-graduate Michael Ren also won the hybrid drawing category at the annual accolades.

Now in its sixth year and attracting nearly 140 entries, the Architecture Drawing Prize is backed by the World Architecture Festival, and prize co-curators Make Architects and Sir John Soane's Museum.

Wen and Ren describe their drawing, for a proposed dumpling institute, as deviating from 'a traditional orientalist attitude towards Chinese culture, while also examining ideas of globalisation and automation'.

The composite drawing used hand-drawn elements together with additions created in Rhinoceros 3D, Adobe Illustrator and Adobe Photoshop. The work featured a plan, two sections, two elevations, four views, six diagrams, one detail and two call-outs. These were arranged in a top-down view of 'a typically Chinese roundtable dining experience'.

Samuel Wen, a bachelor of design and master of architecture graduate from the University of Melbourne as well as a student architect at Cox Architecture, said: 'Being able to convey such ideas and a captivating narrative through drawing had been the aim from the beginning.

'This project meant a lot to us because the broader intention of the drawing was to use architecture to challenge traditional oriental stereotypes about our Chinese heritage.'

A combination of render work and hand-drawn imagery, the Architecture Drawing Prize 2022's winning piece, *Fitzroy Food Institute*, is the result of two architectural minds put together to explore assumptions about their culture. 'The broader intention of the drawing was to use architecture to challenge traditional oriental stereotypes about our Chinese heritage,' says Wen, one half of the winning team and currently a student architect at Cox Architecture, on the aims of the work.

There are three categories for the annual prize: hand-drawn, digital and hybrid, with one winner in each category, as well as one overall winner. Anton Markus Pasing was awarded the digital prize for *The Wall*, a 'golden elevation,' as described by Pasing, and offers an abstract grid of architectural diagrams. Elsewhere, Weicheng Ye was awarded the winning slot for his eerie construction of geometric lines and natural forms in *The Spirit of Mountain*.

Architecture Drawing Prize 2022

Fitzroy Food Institute, which was winner of both the hybrid category and the overall winner, depicts a heavily detailed, cartoon-like dystopia, where a view of a 'dumpling institute' works to challenge stereotypes of Chinese culture. The image comprises an aerial view plan, two sections, two elevations, four further views, one detail and two call-outs, around a traditional round table Chinese dining setup. According to Ken Shuttleworth, founder of Make Architects and one of the Prize's judges, it's both accessible and 'full of architectural interest, featuring not only a plan, but sections and elevations as well as detail.'

Next week sees the launch of a dedicated show at Sir John Soane's Museum, presenting the winning pieces. The exhibition's curator, Erin McKellar, highlights the combination of composite architectural drawings and elements of Chinese culture, and the way in which 'the result is very dynamic. The drawing really gives us a sense of the activity that goes on within the Institute.'

Ren, who is a designer, educator, and architecture student, comments that being able to utilise both his and Wen's creative strengths and 'incorporating both methods of representation [allowed them to] acknowledge a post-digital era in architectural visualisation.'

It works to celebrate the communication of design projects, born from creative, conceptual and planning intentions.

McKellar pulls our attention towards the ways in which the pieces draw lines between different spheres. Memory also appears as a recurring theme in some pieces, which 'draw from their creators' pasts, resulting in drawings which tell stories.'




